# TODAY'S GUEST SPEAKERS

## DAVID COOKE

(1974, History)

David Cooke is currently a Visiting Professor at University College London, and formerly spent nearly twelve years as Director of the British Board of Film Classification (BBFC).

Before the BBFC, he held six government Director level posts, in the Cabinet Office, Northern Ireland Office and Home Office, working on topics such as the Northern Ireland Peace Process, devolution, asylum, criminal justice performance and broadcasting.

David was Head of the Security and International Division of the Northern



Ireland Office from 1990 to 1993, and the Office's Associate Political Director from 2002 to 2004. David will be reflecting on his experiences in the latter post during today's pre-lunch talk.


## MICHAEL GEORGE

(1962, English)

Michael George was born in Cardiff in 1943. He was educated at Bromley Grammar School for Boys in Kent, where he was head boy. In 1962 he won a scholarship to University College, Oxford, where he read English. He became a freelance photographer in 1979, and returned to Britain in 1989, where he now lives in East Sussex.

Michael gave his first solo show, Manhattan, at Brentano's Gallery on Fifth Avenue, New York, in 1981.

His first collection of photographs, The Statue of Liberty, was published in 1985 by Harry N. Abrams, Inc., New York's leading publisher of art books, with whom he had previously been a senior editor. It was hailed by Publishers Weekly as "an arresting tribute by an accomplished photographer." Reviewing the collection in the Los Angeles Herald-Examiner, Digby Diehl wrote: "Michael George is not only a



good photographer who knows how to use the sky like a Broadway lighting director but a deft writer."

Other books by Michael George include The Gardens of Ireland, with text by Patrick Bowe, (1986), New York Today (1988), and The Gardens of Spain, with text by Consuelo Martinez Correcher, (1993).

Michael's latest collection of photographs, Sussex by the Sea, with a foreword by Michael York, was launched in 2011, with a reception, in Eastbourne.



### UNIVERSITY COLLEGE OXFORD

University College (known at least since Victorian times as "Univ.")
was founded with a bequest from William of Durham in 1249, and lays
claim to be the oldest Collegiate endowment in Oxford or Cambridge.
The story that we had been founded by King Alfred in the 870s is
unfortunately just a myth created in the 1380s.

Univ. began life as a small College of just four Fellows, permitted only to study theology, and was for many years one of the poorest Colleges in Oxford. In the sixteenth century, however, we began to accept undergraduates as members. As numbers grew, work began in 1634 to replace the College's medieval buildings with the current Main Quad, which was finally completed in 1677. During this time, the Hall was completed in the 1650s and a Library (later converted to the Alington Room) in the 1660s. Our second quad, the Radcliffe Quad, was built in 1716-19 with a bequest from John Radcliffe, and our most recent building, which included the Butler Room, was completed in 2008.

The College has seen many ups and downs in its history: it lost many of its members both in the English Civil War and in more recent conflicts, but there have been happier times too, such as the 1760s and 1770s when it was arguably the most intellectually exciting College in Oxford, and it strives to maintain that tradition of excellence today.

It has, however, always remained a community of Fellows, students and staff, alike, and has produced many famous Old Members and Fellows, who have made significant contributions to religion, the humanities, the sciences, politics, law, business, literature, education, nationally and internationally.
